SPEAKING OUT CELEBRATIONS

A Sefer Torah is only complete when all its letters are included. Each letter must be perfect, otherwise the whole scroll is not kosher to use. We learn that each person is compared to a letter in the Sefer Torah, each person matters equally, and each person needs to be given the opportunity to communicate and be heard equally, otherwise we, as a people are not complete.

This is the premise of the ground-breaking **Speaking Out Forum** which aims to give people with disabilities and learning difficulties a voice, through public speaking training.

It was a truly inspiring evening when our second cohort of eleven Friendship Circle members, assisted by mentors, completed the ten-part course with a wonderful celebration event at Manchester Central Library, in front of an audience of 75 family and friends, including MP Christian Wakeford. All the participants received a certificate and a medal and mentors were presented with certificates of appreciation.



MY FATHER'S STORY

Friendship Circle Patron Stuart Ferster came to The Friendship Circle on Yom Hashoah to talk to our members about how his father survived the horrors of the Holocaust.

'On Yom Hashoah I was privileged to speak to 25 members of The Friendship Circle about the journey of my father, Chaim Ferster during WW11. You could hear a pin drop! I have only just started telling my father's story under the Northern Holocaust Education Group who have mentored me and helped me put together a powerful PowerPoint presentation. NHEG under the wonderful leadership of Ernie Hunter, train second/third generation survivors to tell their parents and grandparents' story. I have spoken in schools and universities and have been well received with a few questions here and there. Last night in front of these wonderful 25 young adults I was blown away with the quality of their questions.

"How did the German's know who was Jewish?"
"What would have happened to people like us?"
"Where did the word Holocaust come from?"

We are blessed to have such a wonderful organisation like The Friendship Circle in our community and they should be supported.'

Members have spent the last 8 months learning the Alef Bet, which for many was the first time they had been given the opportunity to learn Hebrew. They will now commence the next stage of the course encouraging them to further connect to their Jewish heritage and observance.



RUNNING FOR FRIENDSHIP

This year's 2023 Great Manchester Run was that extra bit special, as not only did it mark the 15th anniversary of The Friendship Circle, but it was also the 20th anniversary of the Run itself!

Tens of thousands took part in the iconic race on the hottest day of the year, including a total of 55 people between the ages of 5-60, who ran on behalf of The Friendship Circle. The group raised a staggering total of £17,358 between them, with teams from Stenecourt Chesed Club and Quooker UK, led by Friendship Circle Patron Stephen Johnson, taking part and fundraising for the charity.

We were overwhelmed by the number of runners we had taking part and fundraising for us this year. A hybrid of school children, volunteers, members, patrons and donors, all came together to support The Friendship Circle. SCHOOL'S WORKSHOP

Friendship Circle members have been involved in running workshops with year 4 & year 5 pupils at Broughton Jewish, King David, North Cheshire and Bury & Whitefield Primary Schools as part of The Friendship Circle's Disability Education Project.

During the 4-part sessions, the children were encouraged to think about disability and inclusion and learn the value of differences as well as challenging stereotypes. The children enjoyed writing postcards about inclusivity, drawing friendship flowers for the art project and creating recipes for their very own Friendship Circle Soup, including essential ingredients such as 'a teaspoon of kindness' and 'a cup of happiness'!

They were also asked to carry out 15 acts of kindness to commemorate The Friendship Circle's 15-year Anniversary. The highlight was the member's panel, where they had the chance to ask members personal questions about what it was like living with a disability.

This ground-breaking programme encourages children to be more accepting and think about important issues that individuals with disabilities are faced with, such as ways that their environment can be adapted to be more accessible.
